Reflection

Today, another U.S. saint is celebrated, St. John Neumann. Unlike Elizabeth Ann Seton, John Neumann immigrated from Bohemia in 1836. Although he had completed his studies as a seminarian, he was ordained in the United States following an arduous and protracted journey through and from Europe to North America. With tenacity and perseverance, St. John pursued his call to mission in the Untied States.

While he felt urged to mission to the German immigrants in Philadelphia, circumstances landed him first in New York where he was ordained and then assigned to the northern part of the state. The area was rural and vast, with churches still under construction and many congregants to serve. He tirelessly travelled and ministered to people with kindness and compassion, and initiated the schooling of young people and often served as a teacher.

Like Elizabeth Ann Seton, John struggled with and met the challenges of his time. Poverty and economic uncertainty, and primitive infrastructure and transportation impacted the lives of those he served as well as his own. Over time, these hardships took a physical and spiritual toll on John. Struggling spiritually, with the advice of his spiritual director, John sought a religious community and was called to enter the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, the Redemptorists. He served his novitiate in Ohio and returned to New York and eventually became a U.S. citizen.

Serving in ministry in a variety of ways, St. John Neumann became the Bishop of Philadelphia in 1852 where he shepherded a large growing and ethnically complex diocese. He nurtured the growth of churches and schools. "....He organized the parochial school system into a diocesan one, increasing the number of pupils almost twentyfold within a short time" (*Saint of the Day*, ed. Leonard Foley, OFM, rev. Pat McCloskey, OFM, 56 Kindle). Unsurprisingly, St. John is the patron of Catholic education. Happy Feast Day!
