
#### Reflection

The month of November makes an entrance with our commemoration of all the saints and souls; we are linked in communion through time, space, and spirit. Although a solemn but celebratory occasion, sometimes our memories of those we have lost can cascade feelings of grief and desolation. At the same time, we may encounter the graces and consolation embedded in those memories and in honoring relationships.

As time passes, as losses accrue and compound, remembering can seem a monumental endeavor. Loss of family, friends, mentors, leaders, jobs, mobility, dignity, integrity and honor, faith and hope, health and security, youth and vigor -- the list builds year after year. Resilience lessens, personal vulnerability increases, and it becomes more of a challenge to build new relationships.

Commemorating the losses in our lives is a courageous and sacred act. While driving around this time of year, I pass by several cemeteries where the beauty of marigolds paints the memorial landscape brightly yellow and orange. The visual display reminds me of the binding nature of community memory and celebration, and the boundless expressions of love. It also retells a story of the strength and endurance needed to walk through these valleys of remembering — and that it takes the sustenance of uniting together. Familiar ritual, prayer and communion gird the spirit to make the journey and celebrate sacred shared moments.

This year we were invited to extend our remembering beyond the immediate, to all those who have died in wars and acts of violence and by natural disaster. The remembering this year might be particular to the time -- and at the same time, there is opportunity to extend the meaning of community beyond borders and difference. May the memory of all those who have passed this year be a blessing.
