LETTING THE LIGHT SHINE

Today's Gospel

Jesus said to the crowd:

"No one who lights a lamp conceals it with a vessel or sets it under a bed; rather, he places it on a lampstand so that those who enter may see the light. For there is nothing hidden that will not become visible, and nothing secret that will not be known and come to light. Take care, then, how you hear. To anyone who has, more will be given, and from the one who has not,

even what he seems to have will be taken away."

LUKE 8:16-18

Reflection

Jesus teaches that no one lights a lamp and hides it under a bed; instead, it is placed on a lampstand so that those who enter may see the light. He warns, "Take care, then, how you hear." This passage reminds us that the light within us, our gifts, our love, our faith, is meant to be shared, not hidden.

Sometimes, fear and injustice threaten to dim the light of others. For instance, on Monday, September 8, 2025, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a ruling that allows federal immigration agents to detain individuals based on characteristics such as speaking Spanish, having brown skin, or working in certain industries like car washes. Many civil rights advocates are concerned about the potential for racial profiling and the impact on the freedom of many people.

The impact of this decision hit home for me. This fear was real for a teenager I heard about on a podcast: he no longer speaks Spanish in public, avoids Latino stores, and changed his clothes. He said it was the first time in his life he felt fear. And in a quiet, visceral way, I felt it too, the fear, the pressure to hide.

The light we carry is not just personal, it is collective. It is the courage to speak out against injustice, to protect the vulnerable, and to create spaces where everyone can live without fear of harm. In our daily acts of faithfulness, small or great, we place our lamp on the lampstand, illuminating paths for others, and standing as witnesses to God's love and justice.

May we commit, each day, to let our light shine boldly, courageously, and in solidarity with those whose freedom and dignity are challenged. Consider engaging in conversations about justice, supporting advocacy organizations, or writing to leaders to express your commitment to fairness and equality.


