Her Story

The familiar poem prayer, "Let nothing disturb you," was written by Doña

Teresa de Ahumada, a Carmelite nun in the Monastery of the Incarnation in Avila. Born in 1515 of a wealthy Spanish merchant, Teresa entered the monastery when she was 20 and soon after her profession, she contracted a serious illness that was poorly treated and nearly caused her death. During her years of convalescence, Doña Teresa experienced many trials and realized she was following the ways of the world rather than the life of prayer she was called to live. Part of this was due to the laxity in the monastery in Avila, which was home to 180 wealthy women, many of whom enjoyed their social life visiting in the parlors of the monastery.

When Teresa was 39, she experienced a midlife conversion that gave her "new life" and she began to experience God as a loving, divine presence. She became disgusted with her mediocrity, and when she glanced on a small statue of Christ in his passion called "Ecce Homo," she was moved by Christ's profound love for her and surrendered herself to him. Another moment in this conversion experience happened when Teresa was reading the Confessions of St. Augustine and was deeply moved by the story of Augustine hearing a voice in the garden. Teresa was also hearing God's intimate call for a deep life of prayer and solitude. Since this was not available in the crowded monastery of the Incarnation in Avila, Teresa began to dream of founding a new smaller monastery that would support solitude and prayer. Eventually she made her first foundation of San José in Avila according to the new contemplative style she developed, and invited 12 nuns to join her. At this time, God gave many mystical graces to Teresa, and she began to write the book of her Life which was followed later by The Way of Perfection, The Interior Castle and her Book of Foundations. She became known as Teresa de Jesús.

In 1567 Madre Teresa de Jesús met Fray John (St. John of the Cross) as she was preparing to begin a new foundation in Medina for a second community of nuns who would make profession to the Carmelite life according to Teresa's contemplative style that she began in Avila. She was 52 and he was 25. Fray John also desired more solitude and prayer and was enthusiastic to work with Teresa to adapt this new reformed way of life for the friars. Eventually this new group of reformed Carmelite men and women were known as "discalced" because they word sandals instead of shoes. Teresa established 17 monasteries for Carmelite Nuns and John established 7 foundations for the Carmelite Friars and wrote exquisite poetry about the mystery hidden in Christ Jesus.

An Excerpt from St. Teresa's Autobiography

"If people have Christ Jesus with them as Friend and loving Guide, they can put up with anything. For Christ helps and strengthens us, he never abandons us, and is a sincere and true Friend. I see ever so clearly that if we want to please God and receive great graces from him, he for his part wants these graces to come through the hands of that sacred humanity which pleased him so greatly."
