From Today's Gospel for the Memorial of St. Monica

LUKE 7:11-17


Reflection

The Gospel above is from the alternate readings for the Memorial of Saint Monica. Jesus, moved by compassion for a mother who lost her son, intervenes -- bringing the dead man back to life. What a fitting passage to remember the life of St. Monica who, while living in a dysfunctional marriage with a husband who in today's world we would identify as a philanderer and abusive, intervened through prayer for her children, particularly Augustine. She was relentless in seeing that her children were baptized into the new life of Christianity, and persisted for seventeen years to ensure that Augustine was brought into the faith.

As a spiritual director, I have listened to the laments of mothers whose children have strayed from, rejected, or for some reason been ostracized by their church of origin. The sorrow of a mother whose child is struggling through a loss of faith, despair, addiction, lawbreaking, or estrangement from the family is heart-rending. How can one not respond with compassion and intentional presence?

A quick sidestep: several years ago while serving in the District Attorney's Office, I got to know and admire Victim Witness Advocates and their good works with victims of crime. In particular, I was moved to behold how these sponsors of justice guided and cared for victims of domestic violence and abuse. The complexity and entanglements of such crimes make navigating the justice system, the ongoing safety of and reentry into a "new normal" for such victims, quite challenging and frustrating. One general observation: Victim Witness Advocates are patient and tenacious in their mission. This reminds me of St. Monica, who not only was persistent with ensuring the welfare of her children, but is also the patron of those challenged by difficult marriages, mothers, alcoholics, wayward children, victims of abuse, conversion, and -- some might add -- patience.

For people and families struggling with the addiction of alcohol: let us pray


For the gifts of patience and tenacity and an abiding faith when facing
