## **An Excerpt from Today's Responsorial Psalm**

My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

**PSALM 63:2** 

### Reflection

One of my favorite prayers is the Anima Christi prayer written by an unknown author but often credited to Saint Ignatius of Loyola, who popularized it.

A line from today's responsorial psalm reminded me of a line in the Anima Christi that I am usually drawn to: "Blood of Christ, inebriate me."

I first heard the prayer in 8<sup>th</sup> grade when I attended Catholic school. I remember learning that the word *inebriated* means to be drunk. Imagine the blood of Christ making you drunk with joy, to the point where even the darkest shadows cannot take that joy away from you.

Actually, I don't have to imagine it; I've had that experience.

COVID cast a dark shadow upon us. Among so many challenges, the pandemic has impacted the opportunity to receive the Blood of Christ during Communion. I went several years without it until one summer my friend's parents decided to put on a small retreat for six of us -- a three-day retreat, held in a cabin up in the mountains.

One day we were told that they had gotten a priest to come and celebrate Mass with us; we didn't think much of it, since our retreats normally had a priest celebrate Mass at least once during our stay. What we weren't expecting was for the priest to break bread with us prior to celebrating Mass. After seeing that we were so close, like a family, and listening to how much we all missed receiving the Blood of Christ, he then asked if we all consented to receiving the Blood of Christ during Communion. We all did.

Upon receiving the Blood of Christ I finally understood exactly what that line in the Anima Christi means, to be inebriated by His Blood. There were many emotions running through me. I didn't know until then exactly how much my soul had been thirsting to receive the Blood of Christ. I felt as if I were on a desert island and a kind stranger appeared out of nowhere and offered me the only potable water.

I have not received the Blood of Christ again since that summer, but to this day I still feel inebriated from when I received it last.

Our souls thirst for God and in return, He inebriates us with the Blood of Christ that grants us everlasting life.

#### Anima Christi


Soul of Christ, sanctify me;
