Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven.


**MATTHEW 5:3-12** 

#### Reflection

Today celebrates the Solemnity of All Saints. It is no surprise that the Gospel reading today is the Beatitudes; it sort of offers a roadmap to sanctity. When I consider the panoply of saintly representation, it does seem the Beatitudes are an appropriate barometer: humility; suffering; contemplative and quiet; righteous; conciliatory and bridge-building; patient and forgiving, and loving, all qualities one might associate with the saints. Not that every saint possessed all of them; even saints had spiritual growing edges.

I am particularly fond of saints who struggled with being saintly. Going back to the very beginnings, Peter was a bit of a hot-head, Thomas a doubter, and Matthew was considered a sinner by virtue of his profession. Mary Magdalene was supposed to have been possessed by seven demons. Some, like St. Augustine and St. Francis of Assisi, lived the wild life as young men. St. Francis De Sales struggled with darkness. St. Ignatius of Loyola was rather violent as a young man and would probably be described today as rakish.

The good news: there's hope for all of us. Today is a celebration of all of the saints, the ones we are familiar with and those that are lesser known or not known at all. When we recite the Apostles' Creed, we acknowledge the Communion of Saints. Broken and imperfect, we celebrate this sacred solidarity. Happy Feast Day!
