ISAIAH 1:10, 16-17


The greatest among you must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but whoever humbles himself will be exalted.

#### Reflection

In the first reading from Isiah, the words "hear, listen, cease, learn, and justice" leapt from the page as I read them. Lent is a time of hearing and listening to God, identifying where we are falling short of where we are called to be as disciples. It is a time given to each of us to make amends or "redress" where we have wandered from the path of life we've chosen to follow.

As noted in yesterday's reflection, this second week of Lent calls us to take stock of our lives and take the necessary steps to correct our missteps. I was captured by the words "learn to do good" because sometimes we're not quite sure the path God intends for us to traverse. Forgiveness is the backdrop to reconciling all that is off quilter in our lives. If we are life-long learners, then our experiences remind us that we are more than capable of self-reflection and self-correction. Our God of Mercy beckons us to repent and mend our ways.

The closing words of today's gospel are clear and direct; "The greatest among you must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but whoever humbles himself will be exalted" (Mt 23:12).




