

WE WALK BY FAITH, NOT BY SIGHT

A Reading from 2 Corinthians

Brothers and sisters:

We are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight.

Yet we are courageous,

and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord.

Therefore, we aspire to please him,

whether we are at home or away.

For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

2 CORINTHIANS 5:6-10

Reflection

"We walk by faith, not by sight" is a line from Paul's second letter to the faith community in Corinth; he wrote this letter in response to a crisis among them. That is the context; however, I will reflect on the line "out of context."

"We walk by faith, not by sight" begs the question: what is faith? The dictionary defines faith as "complete trust or confidence in someone or something." The Catholic Catechism describes faith as "both a gift from God and a human act by which the believer gives personal adherence to God (who invites a response) and freely assents to the whole truth that God has revealed."

"We walk by faith, not by sight." Throughout his public ministry, Jesus responds to and commends the faith of men and women who believe in him:

Now when Jesus heard this (a statement by the centurion seeking a cure for his servant), He marveled and said to those who were following, "Truly I say to you, I have not found such great faith with anyone in Israel."

MATTHEW 8:5

And they brought to Him a paralytic lying on a bed. Seeing their faith, Jesus said to the paralytic, "Take courage, son; your sins are forgiven."

MATTHEW 9:2

But Jesus turning and seeing her said, "Daughter, take courage; your faith has made you well." At once the woman was made well.

MATTHEW 9:22

Then Jesus said to her, "O woman, your faith is great; it shall be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed at once.

MATTHEW 15:28

In these examples and many more throughout the Gospels, people express faith—"sight unseen." They may have heard about Jesus' healing of others, or they may have witnessed a cure; however, their faith—their confidence--that Jesus could and would do something for them "remained to be seen." They "walked by faith, not by sight."

We too, "walk by faith, not by sight" and Jesus acknowledges this in his encounter with Thomas after the resurrection. In response to Thomas' profession of faith, Jesus says, "Have you come to believe because you have

seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." (John 20:29)

We walk by faith, not by sight.
