

#### AS A SHEPHERD TENDS HIS FLOCK

## An Excerpt from Today's First Reading

Thus says the Lord GOD:

I myself will look after and tend my sheep.

As a shepherd tends his flock

when he finds himself among his scattered sheep,

so will I tend my sheep.

I will rescue them from every place where they were scattered

when it was cloudy and dark.

I will lead them out from among the peoples

and gather them from the foreign lands;

I will bring them back to their own country

and pasture them upon the mountains of Israel

in the land's ravines and all its inhabited places.

*In good pastures will I pasture them,* 

and on the mountain heights of Israel

shall be their grazing ground.

#### Reflection

From an early age, my parents helped me understand God as a loving, reassuring force in my life. My mom taught me to see God as a caring and generous parent, and my dad – whenever I tried to weasel out of going to church – would point out that it was important to build a relationship with our Creator. ("When you get 'up there,' you don't want God to say, 'Who are you?" he often pointed out, an angle that makes me chuckle now that I'm a parent myself.)

I especially liked the little cardboard sign that hung in the kitchen of the house where I grew up. "For with God, all things are possible." The bigness of the concept was overwhelming, one I found difficult to internalize. Years ago, my mom gave the little sign to me, and it resides in my cluttered office, slightly the worse for wear -- the concept still overwhelming. But time and again, I have experienced it as true.

That certainly doesn't mean that God makes smooth every path I choose to tread. And it doesn't mean that there is no pain or suffering. As my parents age, as the edges of whatever good health they enjoyed fray more and more, I know that although God is their shepherd as well as my own, they will be led into pastures where I can't immediately follow. This is a line of thought that has come into very sharp focus in recent months, and it's hard to bear.

So I especially treasure readings like today's, during this weird and uncomfortable time in my life when the clouds seem to be gathering. For all God's people will be rescued from the shadows, from every place where it was cloudy and dark. There is a light ahead for all of us; the light of God's love is all around us — no matter how frightening, sad, or infuriating we find the path we're currently traveling. Even as we stumble along, our shepherd guides and guards us.
