

YOUR GRIEF WILL BECOME JOY



Today's Gospel

Jesus said to his disciples: "A little while and you will no longer see me, and again a little while later and you will see me." So some of his disciples said to one another, "What does this mean that he is saying to us, 'A little while and you will not see me, and again a little while and you will see me,' and 'Because I am going to the Father'?" So they said, "What is this 'little while' of which he speaks? We do not know what he means." Jesus knew that they wanted to ask him, so he said to them, "Are you discussing with one another what I said, 'A little while and you will not see me, and again a little while and you will see me'? Amen, amen, I say to you, you will weep and mourn, while the world rejoices; you will grieve, but your grief will become joy."

JOHN 16:16-20

The Gospel today is taken from Jesus' farewell discourse during the Last Supper. It gives us a glimpse into Jesus' love for his disciples: "You are not going to see me for a while..." He was pondering what was about to happen: they would be filled with sorrow and pain to see their Friend and Teacher tortured and killed in a disgraceful way. He could foresee their loss and bewilderment and he wanted to give them a word of hope that it would *only be for a while*: their grief would become joy. The disciples will see Jesus suffer and die, and yet, this pain will give way to joy in his rising from the grave and his living presence within them.
