

Today's Gospel

Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over unclean spirits. He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick — no food, no sack, no money in their belts. They were, however, to wear sandals but not a second tunic. He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave from there. Whatever place does not welcome you or listen to you, leave there and shake the dust off your feet in testimony against them." So, they went off and preached repentance. The Twelve drove out many demons, and they anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

Reflection


This passage from Mark depicts the call of discipleship to the twelve apostles -

and to us! Jesus didn't send them out unprepared and there is a depth of meaning in this passage if we break it open. First, Jesus chose these men to be his first disciples. For those of us who claim our faith, we too are chosen, and it is up to us whether or not we respond to Jesus' call in our lives.

Jesus prepared the disciples through his teaching and healing. We have sacred scripture and our own lived experiences in faith to guide us. We are prepared and it is our responsibility to remain faithful and constantly seeking the wisdom, grace, and call of our Beloved.

The mission of the first disciples is our mission, too. We are called to continue to live and spread the Word of God in our lives. We have each been given gifts and they are ours to "fan into flame!" I have to admit I struggle with "shaking the dust off our feet" if we face resistance to God's message from others. On one hand, I get it — do not waste the precious time we are given in this life on those who refuse to listen. On the other hand, I don't want to give up on people. This is something I continue to ponder and struggle with in my own life — when to move on.

If we read this passage too quickly, we might lose the difficulty of being a follower of Jesus. Yes, the disciples went on to heal and teach as Jesus had taught them. At the same time, we know they faced harassment and threats along the way. That's the reminder to me to keep going even in the face of resistance – mine or others'! It also reminds me that the apostles were sent off two by two; another keen reminder that we need not be lone wolves as we seek to do what is ours to do. We have one another and the synergy and energy we receive from one another is vitally important in staying the course and responding in faith, hope, and love, to whatever comes our way.

For Pondering


- As you read this passage from Mark, what captures your attention? How do you find your life as a disciple of Jesus? What helps and what hinders your ability to respond to God's call in your life?
