

those who have not heard shall ponder it.



## Reflection

Leaving the High Priest's courtyard in haste, he stumbled, blinded by tears, as he quickly made his way down Mount Zion toward the Kidron Valley. Exhausted from crying and running, he stopped to catch his breath. He thought to himself, "Where am I going?" He found a rock to sit on and as he looked down, he saw his hands shaking. Jesus had named him Peter -- "Rock, what a joke," he exclaimed out loud. Intellections moved through his psyche: Gethsemane, Judas kissing Jesus's cheek in betrayal, pulling his sword -- protectively impulsive -- and cutting a man's ear, his denial of Jesus as foretold, the cock crowing. He heaved with sobs, gulping air in between.


## **Companioning Psalm from Today's Readings**
