Reflection


It seems that the lesson to the people Jesus challenged could easily be the same conversation for us today. It is too easy for form quick judgments about someone's behavior and to point fingers in harsh judgment. The adjective "judgmental" describes "someone who forms lots of opinions — usually harsh or critical ones" (Standard Dictionary) — about lots of people who do not seem to be living up to our expectations or standards.

Perhaps the adage "There for the grace of God go I" is worth keeping in the forefront of our minds. We are all sinners to a greater or lesser degree and very much in need of God's mercy and forgiveness. We may sin differently, but sin mars my being nonetheless. It is far easier to judge another than to hold a mirror up to myself.

Recently I was reminded of the difference between grace and mercy. It is a helpful understanding and I realize that I need both. *Grace* is when God gives something we do not deserve. *Mercy* is when God does **not** give us what we **do** deserve.

Let us pray for the grace to see the good in others and to separate the sin from the sinner as Jesus did, as God does for us. You and I do not know what another bears within them that motivates their behavior. Often, we are unconscious of our motivations. Let us pray for one another in our vulnerability and weakness that leads to sin. Let us pray for the mercy we need and have a merciful attitude toward others, rather than condemn one another.

May our Lenten journey instill in us gratitude for God's grace so to arrive at Easter immensely thankful for God's mercy.

May the Word of God guide my mind and heart toward true encounter with Jesus Christ.


Loving God, in your mercy bless me with the grace needed to keep me from judging or condemning others.
