

### **GIFT OF CURIOSITY**

## **Excerpts from Today's Readings**

At that time Jesus exclaimed:

"I give praise to you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike."

#### **MATTHEW 11:25**

Moses was tending the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian. Leading the flock across the desert, he came to Horeb, the mountain of God.

There an angel of the LORD appeared to him in fire flaming out of a bush.

As he looked on, he was surprised to see that the bush, though on fire, was not consumed.

So Moses decided,

"I must go over to look at this remarkable sight, and see why the bush is not burned."

**EXODUS 3:1-3** 

#### Reflection

The Sacred Scriptures invite us to childlike wonder, curiosity, and awe in our relationship with God and life. Moses models curiosity in the face of the unknown or unfamiliar, a burning bush that is not being consumed. Jesus says God is revealed to the childlike. When life happens, or we are surprised or disappointed by what comes our way, it is far better to first be curious rather than fearful, self-protective, and angry. Being defensive in the presence of the extra-ordinary blocks the possibilities for insight, broadening perspective, and wonder. After all, every moment holds the potential to encounter God.

I have watched my grand-nephew, who is naturally curious about everything and everyone. He was born during the height of the COVID 19 pandemic. I first met him when he was two. He confidently strode into our Motherhouse living room and began exploring the environment. He bent to look under a glass-topped coffee table to see how it was made, touching the surfaces with keen curiosity. As he has grown, he continues to be observant, curious, and adventuresome about life, especially new circumstances. He is a wonder of God's great love.

My grand-nephew reawakened in me curiosity as special grace from God. Curiosity opens me to exploration of the unfamiliar, or that which seems contrary to expectation. This is a good way to navigate turbulent times, and contrary facts, and difficult conversations. If I can manage to keep my emotions on hold, I can ask questions that lead to clarity, rather than assuming what another is saying or doing which seems foreign to my sensibilities.

As an adult, curiosity can be elusive. Yet, leaning into my relationship with God, where control is an illusion, curiosity leads to wonder and awe at what God is doing and saying while leading me to discover the deeper truths and realities of life. I choose to foster curiosity and wonder, and to see as God sees. When I awake in the early morning, I stretch, and turn my mind and heart to God in the gift of a new day. I thank God for the blessing of refreshing sleep and ask to be open to whatever God has in store for me today. Prayer and contemplative sitting assist me in living more consciously in God's presence. I have a greater possibility to be ready for whatever comes. I hope to lead with curiosity, marvel at God's abiding presence, and rejoice in all that God is doing.

Rather than focusing on "what is NOT," I seek to focus on "what God IS doing." I want to see life with the eyes of God. Three cheers for childlike curiosity, wonder, appreciation, and awe.
