Reflection

My immediate reaction to today's First Reading was, "Wow – this writer really gets it."

Being human – knowing that I am a part of creation that God chose to make – is a gift so great I can't begin to comprehend it. But that doesn't mean it's easy!

As limited as we all are, compared to God's greatness, we are still so complex – physically, emotionally, spiritually. I can't always fathom the motivations of others, even the people I know well. I can't always prevent a well-laid plan from going awry, no matter how many supporters it has. In this, of course, I am not alone. As the writer so beautifully puts it: "scarce do we guess the things on earth, and what is within our grasp we find with difficulty."

And this is only taking the dear neighbor into consideration! None of us can conceive what God intends, as the writer points out here; we know that "all things work for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28), but sometimes it feels like it takes a very long time to get to that point.

While I appreciate the commiseration of these verses, I also find hope within them. It's true I can't read God's mind or guess how the good can come out of a terrible situation, but I can talk with God about these questions — about anything I don't understand. In prayerful conversation, perhaps I can come to an improved understanding of the people around me or the situations in which I find myself; certainly I can find a source of peace to handle the challenges of life in this world.

Step by step, prayer by prayer, I can have faith that the paths of those on earth may be made just a little straighter – or perhaps I should say: I have faith that at last, I may see the straightness of the paths that, to my faulty eye, looked rough and misaligned.

For Prayer


Almighty God,
