

THE CALL TO LOVE BEYOND RULES

Today's Gospel

Jesus entered the synagogue.

There was a man there who had a withered hand.

They watched Jesus closely

Reflection

This Gospel story reminds us of what truly matters to Jesus: compassion, and love over rules and appearances. In the synagogue, Jesus sees a man with a withered hand who needs healing. The Pharisees, however, are watching closely, not to help but to accuse Jesus if He cures the man on the Sabbath.

Jesus asks a simple question: "Is it right to do good on the Sabbath or to do harm, to save life or to destroy it?" The Pharisees stay silent, showing their hearts are more focused on rules than love. This grieves Jesus but doesn't stop Him from healing the man. By doing so, He teaches us that love and mercy are always the right choices, no matter the day or the rules.

This Gospel reminded me of an incident I recently witnessed. A mentally unwell man left the hospital next door and wandered onto the St. Joseph Center campus. He seemed lost and distressed. Someone called for help, and a Sister of St. Joseph of Orange responded. Instead of turning him away or ignoring him, she approached him, sat with him, and listened. Her calm and compassionate presence brought him peace. Later, after the man recovered, he sent her flowers and visited her, expressing his gratitude for her kindness.

Like Jesus, the Sister saw beyond appearances and rules. She met the man where he was, offering him dignity, care, and love. Her actions mirrored what Jesus does in today's Gospel: choosing mercy and healing over judgment and fear. Jesus calls us to stretch out our hands to receive healing and be instruments of His compassion for others. May we have open hearts like the Sister, ready to sit, listen, and offer love wherever needed.

For Prayer


