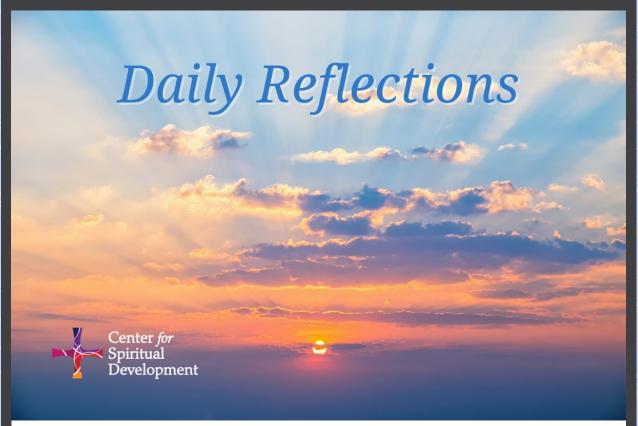

#### Reflection

Tomorrow night begins *Yom Kippur* which extends through Thursday evening. *Yom Kippur* is intended to be transformative, where reflection and taking account leads to action. It is a time of fasting and self-denial, a day to be attentive to self, each other and to God, and to offer heartfelt repentance. Awareness of our mortality, the "great leveler" punctuates the immediacy of the moment and helps to deepen appreciation for the gift of life and relationships.

Teshuva, in Hebrew "turning," requires unmitigated self-examination with an

unfiltered assessment of self. Heschel notes, "We are all failures. At least one day a year we should recognize it." (147) It is assumed that any amends or reconciliation with people a person may have harmed in some way takes place before the day of *Yom Kippur*.

The liturgy includes time for personal as well as communal confession, *Vidui*. The communal confession is chanted as a litany of sins that the congregation takes responsibility for. "Of these wrongs we are guilty:" the prayer begins. There is an amazing physicality to the prayer, with the congregation swaying to the rhythm of the music while each person strikes their breast repenting for each sin. Theft, betrayal, cruelty, corruption, the list is extensive and recognizes that anyone anytime could be guilty of such wrongdoing.

What an amazing recognition! At the heart of this confession is a declaration of compassion toward each other as well as self. Throughout the *Yom Kippur* service we ask for and anticipate God's mercy and compassion in recognition of our brokenness. Perhaps turning back to God compels us to also render mercy and compassion to each other, not just one time a year, but as a way of life.

- Think back to a time where you were forgiven. What was the joy and sweetness of that moment?


# **For Prayer**
