

A STORY OF TRANSFORMATION AND LOVE

Today's First Reading

Paul addressed the people in these words:

"I am a Jew, born in Tarsus in Cilicia,

but brought up in this city.

At the feet of Gamaliel I was educated strictly in our ancestral law and was zealous for God, just as all of you are today.

I persecuted this Way to death,

binding both men and women and delivering them to prison.

Even the high priest and the whole council of elders can testify on my behalf.

For from them I even received letters to the brothers

and set out for Damascus to bring back to Jerusalem

in chains for punishment those there as well.

On that journey as I drew near to Damascus,

about noon a great light from the sky suddenly shone around me.

I fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to me,

'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?'

I replied, 'Who are you, sir?' And he said to me, 'I am Jesus the Nazorean whom you are persecuting.' My companions saw the light but did not hear the voice of the one who spoke to me. I asked, 'What shall I do, sir?' The Lord answered me, 'Get up and go into Damascus, and there you will be told about everything appointed for you to do.' Since I could see nothing because of the brightness of that light, I was led by hand by my companions and entered Damascus. A certain Ananias, a devout observer of the law, and highly spoken of by all the Jews who lived there, came to me and stood there and said, 'Saul, my brother, regain your sight.' And at that very moment I regained my sight and saw him. Then he said, The God of our ancestors designated you to know his will, to see the Righteous One, and to hear the sound of his voice; for you will be his witness before all to what you have seen and heard. Now, why delay? Get up and have yourself baptized and your sins washed away,

ACTS 22:3-16

calling upon his name."

Reflection

Paul's story of transformation on the road to Damascus is a powerful reminder of how God meets us in the depths of our pain, confusion, or even rebellion. Once a zealous persecutor of Christians, Paul encountered the living Christ in a way that forever changed his life. A great light blinded him, brought him low, and led him by the hand to Damascus. It was in his vulnerability, through the compassion of Ananias, that Paul regained his physical and spiritual sight.

Paul's conversion speaks to how God can work through others to reach us, even when we feel far from Him. When I was in my twenties, I faced a darkness that swallowed me whole, a depression so deep that even the smallest acts of care, like bathing or eating, felt impossible. I begged God to take the darkness away, but He seemed absent. In my despair, I decided that God didn't exist. I abandoned my faith, convinced that I was alone.

Months later, as I sat quietly on my sofa, God brought me back to that painful time. I remembered my sister, who visited me daily, ensuring I ate and caressing me until I could sleep. In that memory, I realized God had been with me all along, present in my sister's love, tenderness, and presence. In that realization, I was overcome by a profound love that filled every part of me. It wasn't shame I felt, but gratitude and transformation. From that moment, I have never doubted God's presence.

Paul's story reveals a profound truth: God often works through others to reach us. Sometimes, we can't recognize His presence in the darkness, but He is there in the hands that comfort us, the voices that encourage us, and the love that sustains us. Paul's transformation led him to become a witness to God's love.

May we always remember that God's presence is constant, even when it feels hidden. He is in the people who walk with us, just as Ananias walked with Paul and my sister walked with me. Through these encounters, God's love transforms not only our hearts but the hearts of those we, in turn, are called to serve.
