Reflection

There is quite a bit going in today's Gospel reading. At the beginning, as the group moves stealthily up toward Galilee, Jesus predicts his death for the second time. Naturally, the disciples are confused and do not know how to respond to what Jesus is telling them. Perhaps like many of us who hear from a friend that they have a terminal illness, we simply are speechless or unable to decipher the overwhelming mystery of the news.

Then, as they continue their journey toward their destination, Capernaum, the disciples have a contentious discussion about who is number one, the GOAT, the leader of the pack, who is large and in charge. I can recall many occasions in a work setting where similar conversations and contests ensued. Thinking back, I have to laugh at the hubris of all engaged, particularly myself. Following the reading, Jesus responds to the primacy wrangle with this affirmation: "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all."

Jesus's words are striking as a spiritual direction and, at the same time, hold an expedient truth. As someone who has helped to design and implement organizational and personal leadership development programs and plans, the notion of servant leadership emerges as preferred and contemporary. While the concept was first identified for a business, service or ministry setting by Robert K. Greenleaf over 50 years ago, it appears to have growing significance today. "A servant-leader focuses primarily on the growth and well-being of people and the communities to which they belong. While traditional leadership generally involves the accumulation and exercise of power by one at the 'top of the pyramid,' servant leadership is different. The servant-leader shares power, puts the needs of others first and helps people develop and perform as highly as possible." (https://www.greenleaf.org/what-is-servant-leadership/) In this case, a servant-leader is guided first to serve and then lead.

Going back to today's reading, perchance there are times when invitations from Jesus seem more aspirational than attainable. And yet, here we are, 2000 years later, and the idea of servant leadership is meaningful in a very real-world way. To be a follower of Jesus -- many hopes and endless possibilities.

Our greatest victory the reward of peace.


