Because of my relatives and friends I will say "Peace be within you!" Because of the house of the Lord, our God, I will pray for your good.


PSALM 122:1-4, 6-9

Reflection

In yesterday's reflection on the First Sunday of Advent, I emphasized the word "coming" and spoke to how we engage with the coming of our Lord throughout this season of Advent. As I read the passage from Isaiah in the first reading, it reminded me of the work we are called upon to do during Advent. Advent is not a time for passivity; it is a time of growing deeper in our love and appreciation of our Beloved. Like the people from long ago who heard the words "let us cling the Lord's mountain, to the house of the God of Jacob," we too are called to respond as our journey of Advent unfolds. We are participants, not spectators, as each day of Advent dawns anew.

In the Responsorial Psalm, there is the reminder of the joy, hope, and peace of this beautiful season of Advent. I was struck by the words "Jerusalem, built as a city with compact unity." My heart aches as I reflect on the devastation of so many in the war in Israel, Gaza, and other parts of the world. I'm moved to deeper prayers for peace and a just end to the tragedy that continues to impact the lives of so many.

Finally, in the closing of this excerpt of Psalm 122, we see the words, "Peace be within you! Because of the house of the Lord, our God, I will pray for your good." This is a sentiment, a prayer, and disposition I hope we can all embrace. The simple words, "pray for your good" moves me in ways that are hard to articulate. It flows from the ultimate command to love one another as God loves us. I can't think of a more needed prayer to release into our world than this one at this moment in time.

For Prayer


We pray for the grace to soften our hearts
