Reflection

Many a January I spent time in the desert welcoming in the New Year. Sometimes camping, other times staying with friends or passing through California, Arizona, Nevada—or Algeria and Niger—the desert is a compelling place to be during times of passage. Vast and barren with unique flora and

fauna, windy, cold, and stark, it is certainly not a place one desires to travel without shelter or reasonable transportation.

Reflecting lately, I can't help but wonder what it must have been like for the Holy Family having to flee Bethlehem and make their way to Egypt. Positioning ourselves liturgically, the young family would have been about nine days along in their journey, or perhaps 90-100 miles into their trek, with many miles and days to travel ahead. Conceivably, the route taken would have included hilly and arid terrain, and the peril of wild animals or bandits. Yet, they were literally escaping for their lives, with their child marked for execution, refugees escaping the hateful actions of power-hungry ruler.

Were they welcomed warmly and generously as commanded by Torah? Made to feel as if they were a part of the community? Or were they separated and detained, indefinitely held captive; or were they heartlessly shipped off to an undisclosed location, left adrift and lacking resources to survive? I certainly hope that is not how Jesus and his mom and dad were treated. What about now?
